I used 8"x10", Pastelbord base, mostly Terry Ludwig pastels.



Title: Connection Size: 9" x 12" Surface: UART 500 grit

Combining reference photos is a great way to build a composition that tells a story and/or creates clarity for what the artist is trying to convey.

For this painting, I used 3 reference photos, all of which were taken at the same equestrian event. The main photo was too busy; it had several horses, riders, and spectators watching the event and waiting their turn to enter the ring.

I wanted to focus on just one horse and moment that showed the close connection that often develops between the horse and rider before, during, and after the event. It is what makes them a team.

The other two photos were used to add some color and depth to the composition without distracting from the focal point, i.e. the close relationship between horse and human.

The lemon is from my photo of my one and only Meyer Lemon that I harvested last summer.


Here's my messy combo plate.




"Carnival Illusion" 4x6


